#### I Went . . .

#### **Giving A Little And Receiving A Lot**

In July, 2015, my wife Beth and I arrived in Monte Vista, Colorado to participate in what I thought was to be a group of dental professionals providing health care to a group of needy Amish families. I was not sure what I expected in regard to what we would find there, the life style of the Amish, or how we would be received. In fact what I found was a closely knit group of families, all hard working people, eager to help their neighbor, full of life, energy and smiling faces. Beth and I were invited to stay with the Bishop and his wife in their home while we were there.

On the first day, we set up the equipment, making ready for the first group of patients to arrive. Even with short notice of our arrival date and in the middle of hay cutting season, the families had organized a schedule of patients to show-up at the school where we had established a dental clinic. For the most part those first few patients were the children of the community. They came into the classroom not knowing quite what to expect. Each a little nervous and tense, they sat in the dental chair initially to get their teeth cleaned and then an examination by the dentist if there were problems needing correction. I could see the apprehension in both the children and their parents at this, possibly their first experience with dental work.

During that first day, I did assist with the operation by sterilizing the dental implements as each patient was finished. I did this for a while, but not being a trained dental person, I found it much better working outside with Ben, the Bishop, cleaning the stalls in the barn and trailing after him to learn more about their austere life style. What I discovered was eye-opening. I have never encountered a more devoted, family oriented, hard working group of people. Each family I met while there seemed grateful that we would come there for them and provide free dental service.

While we were there I did have the chance to see hay being mown by horse drawn mowers, experience the living without the benefits of electricity, the camaraderie of families working side-by-side and praying together. Beth and I became friends with Ben, his wife Laura, their three sons and their families, along with many other members of the community. Given the chance, I would look forward to going back to Monte Vista again to experience those feelings of warmth and pride I got while we were serving them.
